COAL AUTHORITY GUIDANCE Hazardous Gases

A new document dealing with the hazards of coal measure gases will be published in the next few months. BDA has been much involved with the Coal Authority in the document's preparation and looks forward to its publication which should bring much needed clarity to the subject.

Back in November 2005 the Coal Authority (CA) issued information that it was 'assisting the police with an investigation into the potential for carbon monoxide to be produced or displaced through drilling and grouting operations in coal measures strata'. The investigation was prompted following the deaths of an elderly couple that year in the West Midlands. In a November 2006 letter to BDA, the CA gave further information that 'at an inquest held into the deaths on 30th October 2006, a jury found that they were convinced that the couple had died of carbon monoxide poisoning and that on the balance of probabilities it was due to disturbance of adjoining land by drilling operations'. This letter introduced the idea that further BDA guidance would be appropriate as to precautions to be taken when drilling through strata thought likely to contain flammable gas.

Following a BDA call for clarification, the Health & Safety Executive (HSE) in May 2007 issued a position statement in which it called for 'water flushing as the primary flushing method for work of this kind'. CA went on to adopt this statement and issue its own revised procedures for companies applying for permits to enter CA property (worked and unworked coal).

NOTE: It's important to take notice here, for those unaware, that drilling into CA property requires prior CA permission. This applies for any form of drilling, not just for drilling & grouting operations. Companies new to drilling e.g. for ground source heat installations may not have come across this requirement yet.

It was another two years before anything further could be done to produce guidance. This was because legal proceedings arising from the original 2005 incident were still in progress. In May 2009 a legal case was settled which cleared the way for CA, HSE, BDA and AGS (and FPS more latterly) to come together to produce unified guidance. A working party was set up and through a series of meetings has now reached the position of issuing a draft guidance document for peer review.

The guidance document titled 'Guidance on Managing the Risk of Hazardous Gases when Drilling or Piling near Coal' will be published simultaneously by its joint authors probably in April once reviewers' comments have been appraised. It will appear on the BDA website and we'll inform BDA members as to when this happens. BDA looks forward to its appearance albeit some six years+ after the unfortunate 2005 incident. Sometimes it takes that long when other parties are involved but the incident's serious nature and its legal ramifications have taken time to unravel.

NSCC Accident Survey 1st April 2010 - 31 March 2011

The BDA is a member of NSCC (National Specialist Contractors' Council) along with 30 other trade associations. NSCC's accident survey report (to which the BDA contributes its statistics) was published in December. A full copy can be obtained from the BDA office.

NSCC's incident rate (Fatalities, Major Injuries, 3 Day Injuries combined) was 810 per 100,000 employees. (BDA was 965 per 100,000). One aspect of NSCC's report was a very significant 37% reduction of the specialist workforce due to recession. (BDA was 21% reduction).

QUICK INFORMATION

CSCS Chairman

Trevor Walker resigned as Chairman of CSCS on 6 December and was replaced by Michael Clapham, a former Labour MP. It is anticipated that the relationship between CSCS and ConstructionSkills will be strengthened and the card scheme will now move forward with the support of the whole industry.

VAT LIABILITY OF GEOTHERMAL DRILLING

Clarity as to what rate of VAT should be charged for geothermal (GSHP) drilling to a domestic customer would appear to have been obtained. This follows a successful appeal by a BDA member against a decision made by HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC).

In March 2011, HMRC had made an assessment that the BDA contractor member had been charging 5% Vat for drilling / loop installation on existing buildings to the residential owner rather than the standard rate of 20%. (HMRC accepted that the same works for new dwellings would be at zero-rate VAT.) The 5% is known as a 'reduced rate' for 'energy-saving materials' and according to HMRC was only applicable to 'ground source heat pumps' amongst other materials listed in the key legislation VATA 1994 Schedule 7A Group 2. HMRC's assessment was that drilling / loop installation, by itself , did not qualify under 'ground source heat pumps'.

The case was complicated but the BDA member felt that while it made no difference to it as to whether it charged 5% or 20% (it could reclaim either), it would however add extra cost to the majority of householders / private clients who couldn't reclaim VAT and thereby dissuade many from having a heat pump.

The BDA Member consulted counsel and thereafter appealed against HMRC's assessment. One of the principal arguments for the appeal was that a ground source heat pump is not functional as 'energy saving material' unless part of a system i.e. with a ground collector. The latter is just as important as the heat pump. The whole system therefore should be eligible for a reduced VAT rate. HMRC had said that should both heat pump and ground collector be together a single supply i.e. from a single contractor / installer then a reduced rate on the whole could be charged. However HMRC said that if two separate contractors were involved, the one doing 'preparatory work' e.g. drilling should be invoicing to residential owner at the standard rate. The BDA member used a principle of fiscal neutrality to argue against this.

In December 2011 HMRC informed the BDA member that it was withdrawing its assessment regarding VAT liability on the geothermal (GSHP) drilling / loop installation. This is a considerable independent success for the BDA member. BDA was standing by to assist should the matter have formally proceeded to a Tribunal.

It must be understood that all VAT matters are extremely complex. HMRC's withdrawal of its assessment in this case is regarded by BDA as being very significant. Should the appeal have failed then HMRC would no doubt have made other companies, providing similar services, immediately liable for the standard VAT rate of all previous and future work. BDA members, variously, will have been applying 'reduced rate' or 'standard rate'. Those members should consider their position following this information but we provide a word of caution. 'One swallow does not make a summer'. It's up to each individual company to examine its own operations as it may be challenged by an HMRC officer at any time. A local decision to withdraw an assessment, in the case of the BDA member, may set a precedent but this may not be binding in all cases. BDA needs to know of any similar cases on this issue, either previous or future, in order to form collective knowledge for any BDA future involvement.

NOTE: For an applicant (45kW therm or below) to qualify for Renewable Heat Incentive (RHI) payments, it will be necessary that the ground source heat pump system is installed by an MCS contractor. The requirements for an MCS contractor contained within MIS 3005 version 3.0 (published 6th September 2011, and in previous versions) is that if any part of the work is done by others then there should be a formal sub-contract in place. Drilling contractors should be aware of this and not take on contracts directly with residential owners (or schemes < 45kW therm) other than through an MCS contractor for the < 45kW applicant to qualify for RHI. It is for the MCS contractor to design and install a fully compliant GSHP system, and accept responsibility for it. Drilling contractors without MCS certification should be wary of contracting directly with residential owners where RHI is involved.

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BDA THREATS AND OPPORTUNITIES A consideration

Traditional business modelling is to consider strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats - otherwise known as SWOT. BDA is no different and constantly reviews this. It's a non-profit Trade Association business owned by its members and responsible to same. Time to examine where it is

Forget that BDA celebrated its 35th anniversary last year. History is no reason for continuance. Any business cannot rely on its brand name established over many years. It has to be relevant to today. Strength of BDA is that it's never failed to deliver in looking forward whilst looking after its current members. Industry today would be suffering if NVQ Land Drilling; CSCS Land Drilling etc. were not in place. To this we can add BDA safety guidance documents which are widely quoted; development of EN and BSI Standards; BDA Audit; Sector Schemes, and a host of other initiatives. All have been funded and brought about through BDA members contributing to a common aim - advancement of the drilling industry.

What are BDA weaknesses? Firstly, not every drilling contractor or associated ground drilling company is a BDA member. Some choose to remain outside but benefit from BDA work. Maybe a cost saving for them but are they committed to the industry at large? Secondly, BDA does not market itself sufficiently to retain existing members or recruit new members - we'll be publishing more about what we do to rectify this. Thirdly, BDA may fail to deal with member issues but we need to be told about them. There may be other weaknesses but BDA is addressing them on an every increasing basis, and it's foremost on the BDA agenda.

Opportunities are central to BDA thinking. The opportunity to make a difference is paramount and always has been. It's never been driven by commercial ambition. BDA member funds are solely used for industry wellbeing.

Threats to BDA may be apparent. Pretenders (commercial interests seeking a profit) are not Trade Associations and should be avoided.

BDA Audit Information

BDA Audit is the successor to BDA Drilling Accreditation and differs from the former scheme in that all audited operatives possess an NVQ, level 2, in Land Drilling and valid CSCS card in Land Drilling. It's open to Lead Drillers / Drillers and any drilling discipline.

It's becoming a necessity. Clients will be specifying it in order to conform to Eurocode & British Standards - BS 22475-2 & -3 and Amendment 2 of BS 5930 - and also the revised SISG (Site Investigation Steering Group) documents. It will also be necessary for those in geothermal drilling in order to satisfy the UKAS certification scheme requirements.

Please note that the BDA Driller Accreditation Scheme was wound up in 2005. Those who belonged to it should no longer be claiming that they are currently BDA Accredited. This would be an act of misrepresentation and the Association retains the right to take action should evidence reach it of this taking place.

BDA Audit is the only accreditation now issued for drilling operatives. Don't get left behind in not being able to satisfy tender requirements. Apply for details now to the BDA office and get ahead of the crowd.
